Research Question

How have the genre configurations of popular films changed over time?

<u>Data</u>

- Top-30 films/yr, 1946–2013 (sources: Variety & BoxOfficeMojo.com)
- N=2,029 films
- 17 genres; 126 genre configurations (source: Rovi Data)

<u>Findings</u>

- Post-war era (1946-72) exhibited greater generic diversity than current blockbuster era (1973-2013)
- Post-war era privileged serious films and realistic settings
- Blockbuster era privileges intense films and nonrealistic settings





Mean (Raw) Configurations per Year by Industry Period




Generic Similarity of Industry Periods



Unique Genre Configurations, Post-war Period




1946-1959

Findings

- More genres were prominent during post-war era and they were combined in many different ways.
- Popular films increasingly alike during blockbuster era.
- Comedy always popular.
- Post-war era: gravity (drama, romance, epic) combined with realism (Western, war, historical).
- Blockbuster era: intensity (action-adventure, thriller, horror) combined with non-realism (fantasy and science fiction).
